"After hearing Bruce Hennes talk about crisis communications at the Lake County Administrator retreat, our team came away with very practical information all school district leaders should have in this error of 'gotcha journalism.' At the end of the first quarter in the fall, we had a couple of diverse incidents occur where we had to employ some of what Bruce taught and thought our professional staff should also learn from Bruce. We subsequently asked him to custom-design a program about the use – and misuse – of social media. This in-service was well received by our entire staff, from the novice teacher to the veteran.
